#### What does the Fund invest in?


The Fund invests primarily in stocks of small and medium capitalization Canadian corporations. Up to 30% of the Fund's assets may be invested in foreign securities.

#### How risky is it?

The value of the Fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.

One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund's returns change over time. This is called "volatility".

In general, funds with higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

#### **Risk rating**

1832 Asset Management L.P. has rated this Fund's risk to be high.

This rating considers how much the Fund's returns have changed from year to year. It doesn't tell you how volatile the Fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money.

#### How has the Fund performed?

This section tells you how the Series F units of the Fund have performed over the past 9 years. Returns are after expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the Fund's return.

#### Year-by-year returns

This chart shows how the Series F units of the Fund have performed in each of the past 9 calendar years. The Fund dropped in value in 3 of the 9 years. The range of returns and change from year to year can help you assess how risky the Fund has been in the past. It does not tell you how the Fund will perform in the future.



#### Best and worst 3-month returns

This table shows the best and worst returns for the Series F units of the Fund in a 3-month period over the past 9 years. The best and worst 3-month returns could be higher or lower in the future. Consider how much of a loss you could afford to take in a short period of time.

#### Average return

A person who invested \$1,000 in Series F units of the Fund 10 years ago now has \$2,293. This works out to be an annual compound return of 8.7%

<ul> <li>Investors who:</li> <li>want a Canadian medium capitalization value holding in a diversified portfolio</li> <li>invest for the long term</li> <li>are very comfortable with the ups and downs of the stock market</li> <li>Series F units are generally available only to investors who have fee-based accounts with authorized representatives, including ScotiaMcLeod.</li> <li>Don't buy this fund if you need a steady source of income from your investment.</li> </ul>	In general, you'll have to pay income tax on any money you make on a fund. How much you pay depends on the tax laws where you live and whether or not you hold the fund in a registered plan, such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan or a Tax-Free Savings Account. Keep in mind that if you hold your fund in a non-registered account, fund distributions are included in your taxable income, whether you get them in cash or have them reinvested.

#### How much does it cost?

The following tables show the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own and sell Series F units of the Fund. The fees and expenses, including any commissions, can vary among series of the Fund and among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other funds and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

#### 1. Sales charges

Series F units of this Fund are classified as 'no-load', meaning there are no sales charges when you buy units through 1832 Asset Management L.P. or our affiliates. You may be required to pay sales charges if you buy units through other registered representatives.

#### 2. Fund expenses

You do not pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the returns of the Series F units of the Fund.

As of June 30, 2019, Series F units of the Fund's expenses were 1.24% of its value, which equals \$12.40 for every \$1,000 invested.

#### More about the trailing commission

No trailing commissions are applicable to the Series F units of the Fund.

#### 3. Other fees

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell or switch units of the Fund.

Fee	What you pay
<ul> <li>Short-term trading fee</li> </ul>	2% of the value of units you sell or switch within 31 days of buying them. This fee goes to the Fund.
<ul> <li>Registered plan fee</li> </ul>	If you invest through a Registered Plan available from Scotia Securities Inc. then a withdrawal or transfer fee of up to \$50 may apply. If you invest through a Registered Plan with another Scotiabank dealer or another financial institution then you can contact your broker or dealer at the other financial institution to determine if they charge any Registered Plan fees.
<ul> <li>Fee-based account fee</li> </ul>	You may pay a fee, which is negotiated between you and your representative and paid directly to your representative's firm. Investors who purchase this series of the Fund must participate in an eligible fee-based or wrap program with their representative's firm.

#### What if I change my mind?

Under securities law in some provinces and territories, you have the right to:

- withdraw from an agreement to buy units of the Fund within two business days after you receive a copy of the Fund's simplified prospectus or Fund Facts document, or
- cancel your purchase within 48 hours after you receive confirmation of the purchase.

In some provinces and territories, you also have the right to cancel a purchase, or in some jurisdictions, claim damages, if the simplified prospectus, annual information form, Fund Facts document or financial statements contain a misrepresentation. You must act within the time limit set by the securities law in your province or territory.
